



onsidered in terms of wine, one might describe Jill Conn's home nestled in California's renowned Napa Valley as bold and organic, with undertones of wood, metal, and stone that are infused with slight hints of glamour and topped off with high notes of subtle textures. "We wanted something timeless but that also reflected the rural setting in wine country," says Jill about the home perched on 5 acres of steep hillside property near St. Helena. "We also wanted a barnlike ambience with an open floor plan, where the inside naturally flows to the outside and maximizes the incredible views."

An amalgam of organic elements—such as white-oak cabinetry, granite and soapstone countertops, oak floors, plaster walls, a limestone chimney, and exposed beamsunite the home with the spectacular terrain in which it's cradled. "The home's design is based on the simple, agrarian forms that are prevalent in the Napa Valley," architect Karen Jensen says. "On arrival, it feels like a single-story house, but then you walk into the great-room and see the 36-foot-wide retractable panel doors that open up to the multilevel pool and patio area. The view of the rolling hills becomes intimate. Surprises like that make this home atypical."

Interior designer Jennifer Macdonald selected furnishings and rugs that further establish the home's natural, rural aesthetic—think materials such as jute, velvet, and reclaimed wood. But unexpected touches of glamour keep things visually interesting. "I call it organic glam," Macdonald says. "There definitely are quintessentially organic wine-country elements throughout the home, but we also wove in moments of elegance."

To complement instead of compete with its surroundings, the home features a non-trendy, neutral color palette of cooler light grays and blues that creates a calm aesthetic. "We didn't want anything that would feel dated in 10 years," Jill says. "We wanted something timeless and sophisticated."

While the home was designed for entertaining friends and family, it also has to withstand other forces of nature: two children and two dogs. As such, durable and functional materials such as stainproof furniture fabrics and outdoor rugs amiably rub shoulders with the more sophisticated elements. "Every material was thoughtfully selected to withstand wear and tear," Macdonald says.

But in the end, the house is all about drinking in the surrounding wine country vistas. "The whole house celebrates both its surroundings and indoor-outdoor living," Macdonald says.
